Report from the Board Chair and Executive Director

This year North Shore Neighbourhood House is celebrating its 80th year.

Definition of a neighbourhood house – Neighbourhood Houses bring people together to connect, learn and contribute in their local community through social, educational, recreational and support activities, using a unique community development approach. Community development is about enabling communities to identify and address their own needs.

Going into our 80th year of service for the community and the people that live here we have much to reflect back on.

What we know is that our initial response to community need that was developed in 1939 remains our driving force.

Dates and archives have helped us to understand the journey that the 'House' has been on and the realization that there is so much more that can and will happen.

1939 - The NSNH was granted a home by the city of North Vancouver after much hard work by local residents, most notably Hugh and Rose Beattie.

1940 - Through donations of time and energy many hard working North Vancouver citizens created a meeting space for teens, adult and seniors. The focus of need changed quickly in 1940 when the war brought a significant increase in women in the ship building work force resulting in the need for child care.

1972 – North Vancouver Recreation Commission was established and a long association with the Neighbourhood House begins, an association that continues today.

1983 – NSNH became the home of Greater Vancouver Food Bank for the North Shore.

1990 – The Young Parent Program began resulting in a child care centre starting at Sutherland School.

Financial Report

The North Shore Neighbourhood House experienced an increase in Revenue from prior year primarily due to an increase in Provincial Government funding, including a one-time grant, new child care subsidy program funding to name a few. With regards to the one time grant, one of the major uses of these funds was to purchase a new transport bus which will enhance several programs and reduce costs of maintenance on the old bus. Also many newly needed program supplies and equipment were purchased to upgrade current childcare facilities. In addition, the new Centreview location is fully up and running, and all child care facilities are at capacity leading also to an increase in fee revenue.

With an increase in activity also brings an increase in expenses, most notably in salaries and benefits and an increase in staff required to effectively run all facilities and programs to a standard the community has come to expect. The North Shore Neighbourhood House continues to pride itself on providing full life cycle services from childcare to youth programs to senior programs. The North Shore Neighbourhood House is also extremely grateful to all funders and donors whom have supported the organization over the past year.

2004 – John Braithwaite building was built to support more programs for North Shore residents.

2005 – Edible Garden Project began and Loutet Farm opened in 2011.

2006 – NSNH became accredited.
